Our Network's 2024-25 year was characterized by notable accomplishments and encouraging momentum for the future of local economic development in Quebec. The newly established capacity-building program for SADCs and CAEs represents a significant advancement for our organizations, enabling all members to enhance their local interventions through the preservation of resources and the cultivation of expertise associated with the newly allocated dedicated funds.



Our presence has been firmly established within the Quebec economic development ecosystem. FUNDING FOR ENTREPRENEURS

A total of \$86 million has been distributed to companies in the form of loans, broken down as follows:

\$71.4 million through our standard investment funds \$11.4 million in support for entrepreneurs under 39 **\$812,000** dedicated to flexible women entrepreneurs \$1.84 million allocated from the Transfer Strategy Fund **\$510,000** sourced from the Digital Strategy Fund \$700,000 drawn from the Green Strategy Fund

The Network: Three **Decades of Influence**







→ The establishment of the \$9.6 million Small Business Support Fund served as a swift response to the challenges posed by the economic crisis. Developed and implemented within a matter of weeks, it offered vital assistance to nearly 100 regional SMEs and preserved over 2,000 jobs.

→ The SADC and CAE have now extended their reach to all rural areas of Ouebec, broadening their services to encompass the MRC of Caniapiscau, Saint-Hyacinthe, Argenteuil, and the Soulanges region.



Our network brings together 57 SADCs and 10 CAEs, which have collectively dedicated over 40 years to promoting economic development across Quebec's regions. A dedicated team of 350 professionals, along with more than 600 volunteers, manages the Community Futures Program (CFP) in all areas, providing support and funding to over 10,000 entrepreneurs and 1,500 local economic development initiatives each year. The CFP is a federal initiative that recognizes the expertise of local decision-makers and the significance of independent decision-making, encouraging community involvement in shaping their future. Furthermore, the CFP is implemented on a national scale through funding for 269 SADCs and CAEs.

SADC AND CAE: THE VITAL PARTNERS FOR ENTREPRENEURS AND COLLECTIVE INITIATIVES

Over the course of the year, the SADCs and CAEs provided \$86 million in loans and \$2 million in technical assistance, benefiting over 1,664 businesses throughout the regions of Quebec. These investments, along with the dedicated support from our professionals, empowered many businesses to carry out their projects, adjust to economic challenges, and generate wealth within their communities.

Furthermore, approximately 788 collaborative projects are launched each year across Quebec's regions, thanks to the commitment of SADCs and CAEs to foster local economic development. This year, these initiatives represent a total investment of \$5 million.

LOCAL ECONOMIC GROWTH

This year, \$5 million has been allocated to various collective projects, with the SADCs and CAEs contributing \$2.6 million through the Local Intervention Measure (MIL) to support 392 high-impact initiatives. The MIL is dedicated solely to advancing structural initiatives and serves as a crucial catalyst for regional transformation this year.

Objectives of the Initiatives:

- Promote the growth of local businesses
- Create and maintain high-quality job opportunities
- In response to the challenges posed by labor shortages,
- Promote the retention of talent within the regions.

At the heart of the initiatives launched through the MIL are numerous projects aimed at mobilizing essential resources to tackle significant economic challenges and enhance local capacities. Notable achievements include a local procurement campaign, a symposium on business transitions, training programs for women entrepreneurs, a gala honoring sustainable development, heritage promotion efforts, a committee focused on church conversions, among others.

Thanks to the MIL, SADC and CAE professionals dedicated their time and energy to these projects. Additionally, nearly 45% of the initiatives were implemented directly by SADC and CAE development agents, highlighting their crucial role in community engagement and development. A significant portion of the activities focused on entrepreneurs, youth, and women—three essential pillars of regional vitality.

The total economic benefits generated by the projects supported under the MIL program are estimated to reach \$11.2 million, reflecting the collaborative efforts of all partners involved.

ACCOMPANIEMENT

The support provided by SADCs and CAEs extends far beyond mere financing, with over 1,664 entrepreneurs benefiting annually from their guidance on initiating, expanding, or transitioning businesses. They aid entrepreneurs in assessing the genuine needs of their companies, identifying partners and potential successors, and directing them to pertinent tools and programs.

→ EXTERNAL TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE

When entrepreneurs require more sophisticated technical support, SADCs and CAEs can also fund the engagement of external consultants. This year, \$2 million was allocated for technical assistance related to this component.

Investments in external technical assistance have significantly advanced entrepreneurs in various critical aspects of their development. They have benefited from support in financial management, comprehension of the legislative and tax implications of business transfers, and the formulation of effective tax strategies.

In the present economic landscape, technical assistance has empowered numerous SMEs to investigate promising new markets that are directly associated with their existing operations. This strategic support is also designed to enhance management practices, validate business trajectories, and pinpoint promising sectors to foster growth and innovation.

Specialized assistance was also extended to various SMEs to facilitate the implementation of a sustainable development policy aimed at achieving recognized certification, as well as to conduct cybersecurity audits designed to enhance the digital resilience of enterprises.

THE SMALL ENHANCEMENTS THAT REINFORCE OUR SUPPORT

Thanks to recent investments designed to bolster the intervention capabilities of SADCs and CAEs, these organizations have not only fortified their teams but also amplified their on-the-ground initiatives. These incremental enhancements have tangibly resulted in increased expertise and ongoing support for entrepreneurs, especially in critical domains such as digital technology, the green transition, and business succession.

→ STANDARD INVESTMENT FUND

Over the course of the year, the SADCs and CAEs distributed **\$71.4 million** in loans through their standard investment fund to foster business development. A remarkable total of 860 loans were granted, highlighting our unwavering dedication to revitalizing the local economy, supporting the growth of SMEs, and promoting job creation across all regions.

→ YOUTH STRATEGY FUND

Supporting the next generation of entrepreneurs has always been a core priority for our Network. Investing in young individuals means investing in the future of our communities. With this mindset, we have been implementing the Youth Strategy since 1997, a comprehensive program developed in partnership with Canada Economic Development for Quebec Regions. Through this initiative, we offer support and funding to individuals aged 39 and under who wish to start a business or acquire an existing one.

Over the years, this strategy has proven its effectiveness and impact. More than 14,000 young entrepreneurs have successfully achieved their business goals, whether through innovative projects, local enterprises, or business successions. In total, the SADCs and CAEs have invested \$215 million, resulting in an impressive leverage effect of 1 in 10.

The momentum continues! This year alone, \$11.4 million has been allocated to assist 546 young entrepreneurs across Quebec. These individuals are revitalizing our regions, creating sustainable jobs, and ensuring the economic strength of our communities.



→ NEWLY ALLOCATED FUNDS

Addressing Challenges Faced by Quebec Communities

In December 2024, the Réseau des SADC et CAE launched three new funds across the province to provide financing to SMEs. This initiative aims to help them confront challenges related to business transfer, the green transition, and digital transformation.

\$3.1 M ALLOCATED AMONG

83 BUSINESS

In addition to financing, the professionals within our network enhance their expertise by offering support in these three areas through co-development groups and specialized training programs.

Overall, these funds provide loans of up to \$50,000, featuring a two-year interest holiday and a principal moratorium for the initial three months, with the option for extension of up to two years.



→ TRANSFER STRATEGY FUND

The Transfer Strategy Fund was created to support the transition of businesses within the region, covering internal and family succession alongside business acquisitions. As of December 2024, the fund has achieved the following:

- \$1.84 million allocated to 54 companies
- Each dollar leveraged \$20
- 593 jobs preserved and created



SADC+CAE INTERVENTION CENTERS

ADVANCEMENTS IN SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT EXPERTISE THROUGH THE DD GROUP OF SADC AND CAE

Founded in 2008 by visionaries in sustainable development from the Réseau, the Sustainable Development Group has continuously expanded and strengthened its influence. It now comprises 56 active members from SADCs and CAEs, all committed to improving internal expertise in sustainable development through knowledge sharing, tool creation, and collaboration.

In 2024, three meetings provided members with opportunities to learn, exchange ideas, and find inspiration on relevant topics. In February, 70 participants took part in a webinar on digital sobriety, exploring how technology can aid the ecological transition of SMEs. In April, 53 members attended a presentation on artificial intelligence for sustainable development, which offered practical solutions for SMEs.

Lastly, during the réseau's Semi-Annual Meeting in October in Lévis, 107 members gathered for an engaging activity titled the Fresco of Stories – New Imaginaries: On the Road to a New Society. This interactive workshop allowed participants to deconstruct existing narratives and collaboratively create inspiring visions of a society aligned with socio-environmental transition.






→ GREEN STRATEGY FUND

This fund aims to accelerate the shift towards sustainability for small businesses in Quebec by encouraging the adoption of environmentally friendly practices and the use of clean technologies. Key focus areas include improving energy efficiency, managing waste materials in small and medium-sized enterprises (SMEs), and minimizing greenhouse gas emissions.

- \$510,000 allocated to 13 companies
- Each \$1 invested leveraged \$4.
- 103 jobs have been preserved and created.






→ DIGITAL STRATEGY FUND

The aim of this fund is to accelerate the digital transformation of small businesses by facilitating the adoption of management systems (CRM, ERP), automating processes, integrating robotics, implementing home automation, and improving IT security.

- \$700,000 allocated from a \$4.1 million financial package
- 20 projects funded
- 328 jobs preserved and created





A PROJECT THAT SHOWCASES THE EFFECTIVENESS OF OUR INTERVENTION CENTERS

For over 15 years, the SADC and CAE Network have prioritized sustainable development, leveraging their expertise in local economic development, financing, and business support to promote the adoption of environmentally responsible business practices.

Led by the SADC Papineau-Collines, the Together, Decarbonize! project exemplifies this integrated approach. It provides businesses with a systematic framework to comprehend and mitigate their carbon footprint. In a codevelopment format, entrepreneurs engage in four collaborative workshops, receive expert guidance, obtain a customized carbon assessment, and identify specific actions tailored to their unique requirements: energy efficiency, waste reduction, transportation optimization, and more.

This project transcends diagnostics; the SADC also assists businesses in identifying financing sources to implement their initiatives. Once emissions are reduced, they become eligible for the SADC and CAE Carbon Credits project, the sole initiative enabling small businesses to access the Voluntary Carbon Market (VCM) and receive financial compensation.

SINCE JANUARY 2024:

20 companies received support, resulting in approximately thirty concrete actions and the emergence of nearly \$500,000 generated spin-offs in the voluntary carbon market.

These companies enhance their profitability, bolster their reputation, and increase their capacity to attract a skilled workforce.

With Ensemble décarbonons!, the SADC Papineau Collines is effecting a significant change in its community and motivating other SADCs and CAEs throughout Quebec, as a training program specifically designed for SADC and CAE advisors has been established to facilitate the implementation of this project in additional communities!

These tools, easily accessible on our web platforms, promote an agile and forward-thinking approach.

GOFIN: THE ULTIMATE DIRECTORY OF FUNDING AND GRANTS FOR SMES

Launched in the fall of 2024, GoFin is accessible at no cost to all entrepreneurs via the SADC and CAE Network website. This tool enables businesses and SADC and CAE advisors to swiftly identify financing options customized to their specific needs. Since its inception, nearly 1,000 entrepreneurs have utilized the search function.

Additionally, with the GOFin Pro Advisor license embraced by numerous SADCs and CAEs, they can convert their data and notifications into strategic opportunities. The introduction of new key local notification features, tailored to the specific territories of each SADC and CAE, enables the provision of even more relevant and targeted support to their clients.



GODATA: LEVERAGING THE CAPABILITIES OF ARTIFICIAL INTELLIGENCE DATA

AI mapping serves as a potent and pertinent instrument for the strategic advancement of our organizations and the economic growth of our regions. Consequently, our organization has embraced GoData, a tool developed by Civision. With its user-friendly interface, this solution enables the Network, SADCs, and CAEs to generate profiles and analyses of their regions, utilizing approximately fifty factual socio-economic indicators.

In 2024-2025, the SADCs and CAEs maintained their dedication to accessibility and linguistic inclusion via the Program for the Delivery of Services in Both Official Languages. Financial backing of \$570,000 reinforced initiatives aimed at delivering quality services to the population in both French and English across the territory.

This investment empowered SADCs and CAEs to enhance their practices, allowing all individuals to communicate in their preferred official language and access equivalent services, irrespective of their location. Drawing from the consultations conducted, they successfully adapted their communication tools, executed promotional activities for their services, provided online training, and organized events in both languages.

Our commitment to enhancing service to communities is evidenced by tangible actions, particularly our partnership with CEDEC (Community Economic Development and Employability Corporation). This collaboration enables us to gain a deeper understanding of local realities and, consequently, to fortify our connections with English-speaking communities.

This tangible advancement demonstrates our commitment to providing equitable and inclusive services tailored to the specific needs of the communities we serve.

ENTREPRENEURIAL JOURNEY

Partnering with a local from the Bas-St-Laurent region, he was driven by a strong desire to make a positive impact on his new community. As an English-speaking entrepreneur, he decided to contribute through his culinary expertise. As an experienced chef, William committed himself to understanding his surroundings. He observed local consumption habits, engaged with residents, and evaluated the area's needs. It soon became clear to him that there was a gap in the roast chicken market regarding both quality and pricing. This realization inspired him to launch a product under the M. Poulet brand, known for being 100% fresh, flavorful, and budget-friendly, all delivered through a quick and efficient model.

This opportunity, while promising, posed a challenge for an anglophone looking to establish a business in a predominantly French-speaking region. However, fueled by his passion and with his partner's help in navigating the language barrier, William embarked on his entrepreneurial journey. He introduced a mobile concept that embraces a retro vibe.

Support from the SADC and CAE Network was crucial in bringing this project to life. With the guidance of an advisor dedicated to assisting English-speaking clients—a service recently implemented to strengthen ties with these communities—William received personalized and financial support.

Furthermore, the SADC des Basques provided a loan to help establish the business

An exceptional program!

The Canadian Digital Adoption Program:

A pivotal mechanism for the digital transformation of Quebec SMEs

Three years after its launch, the Canadian Digital Adoption Program (CDAP) is demonstrating a tangible impact on Quebec's entrepreneurial fabric. Between 2022 and 2025, 61% of participating companies saw a significant increase in sales, of which 44% grew between 10% and 25%, and 10% exceeded this threshold. At the same time, 32% generated new jobs.

Piloted in Quebec by the FCCQ and the Réseau des SADC et CAE, the PCAN aimed to increase business productivity and competitiveness through digital technology. Over 11,500 companies were supported, mainly micro-businesses (82%), with a strong representation of small businesses (17%).

The initiative has made a significant contribution to the development of digital skills: 84% of companies have acquired new expertise, and 78% are considering other digital projects. Preferred areas include digital marketing (71%), content creation (61%) and management (51%).

Artificial intelligence (AI), while still in the exploratory stage (36% have adopted it), is generating significant interest: 67% of companies seek to leverage it further.

Retail leads in demand at 21%, followed by construction at 12% and professional and cultural services. Montreal is notable at 23%, while regions such as Montérégie at 17% and Capitale-Nationale at 12% also exhibit significant growth.

The PCAN represented a pivotal moment for SMEs regarding digital transformation, operational efficiency, and overall appeal. This initiative has demonstrated its effectiveness as a significant catalyst for local economic development.

PROMOTING FEMALE ENTREPRENEURSHIP: A PRIORITY FOR OUR RÉSEAU

In Canada, merely 31% of small and medium-sized enterprises (SMEs) are either majority-owned or equally owned by women. A study conducted by McKinsey & Co. indicates that the complete integration of women into the economy could result in a 6% increase in Canadian GDP. Women play a crucial role in entrepreneurship, and our Réseau is dedicated to supporting them through tangible initiatives such as the Flexiprêt.

FLEXI-LOAN FOR WOMEN: A PILOT INITIATIVE IN COLLABORATION WITH THE SADC SHAWINIGAN

In response to this need, our Réseau, in partnership with SADC Shawinigan, is currently piloting the national Flexiprêt initiative for women. This program offers tailored support and flexible financing solutions specifically designed for flexipreneurs.

Launched in January 2024 in collaboration with Women and Gender Equality Canada, the pilot project is being implemented by 11 SADCs and CAEs across Quebec. The results so far are very promising:

- → 92 Flexipreneurs received support
- → \$812 200 investments in the form of loans,
- → DOZEN of free trainings were offered.

At the same time, data is being carefully collected. A research report, developed in partnership with the Université du Québec à Trois-Rivières, will outline the challenges flexipreneurs face and offer recommendations to support their success.

Our commitment to regional entrepreneurship remains unwavering. We continue to support youth through accessible loans under the Youth Strategy program and promote women's entrepreneurship through financing initiatives like the Flexipreneure program.

We are also focused on strengthening our role as a strategic partner to SADCs and CAEs. We will continue to equip and support them as they respond to the specific needs of the communities they serve.

Message from the Treasurer

JOCELYN GURNARD

As of March 31, 2025, Capital Réseau's assets under management exceeded \$130 million. This figure reflects the network's confidence, the strength of our management, and our collective ability to generate concrete impact in communities.

During the 2024-2025 fiscal year, we awarded 29 regular loans totaling \$8.2 million. Of these, \$5.6 million was awarded for the Regular Fund (11 loans), and \$2.6 million for the Youth Strategy Fund (18 loans). These loans are not simple transactions: they support promising projects in the regions, create jobs, and support entrepreneurs where the needs are most urgent.

Since 2020, Capital Réseau has administered the Regional Relief and Recovery Fund (RRRF). As of March 31, 2025, \$63.4 million had been repaid, with a loss rate limited to only 5%. \$5.8 million remains in active loans to businesses. This recovered capital has not remained idle: nearly \$63 million has already been recommitted to structuring initiatives, including more than \$9 million deployed during the 2024-2025 fiscal year.

\$34.8 million has been committed to accelerate business transfers, the ecological transition, and the digital transformation of SMEs. Since the launch of these funds in December 2024, \$3.08 million has already been loaned to innovative and strategic businesses. \$38.25 million has been allocated to capacity building for SADCs and CAEs, to give them the means to maximize their impact in the regions. Since September 2024, \$3.8 million has already been deployed for this purpose. Entrepreneurial succession remains at the heart of our priorities, with a capitalization of \$1.7 million for 7 CAEs.

Throughout the year, we also continued to actively support the Youth Strategy Fund, with tailored financing terms: 0% interest rates for two years and interest rebates. 34 SADCs and CAEs were able to offer these terms to their young entrepreneurs, thereby increasing access to financing and strengthening the fund's local roots in communities.

Finally, an additional \$615,000 was mobilized to support women's flexipreneurship in SADCs and CAEs. For us, supporting women's entrepreneurship is a strategic requirement for building an inclusive and sustainable economy.









